Year 6 Trip to Churchill's War Rooms & Westminster Abbey

On Monday 24th February, Year 6 visited The Churchill War Rooms and Westminster Abbey. The two places linked beautifully into to our current history unit on World War II and the children were able to extend their knowledge and learn some interesting and fun facts about WWII as well as linking their prior historical learning. The children and adults had a fantastic day, despite a rainy start and would highly recommend visiting both places.

Taiyo: "It was a great day out. The Churchill War Rooms really helped me feel what life was like during WWII as the rooms had been left exactly like they were in the War. My favourite part was finding out that the Coronation Chair is covered with graffiti from the boys that studied at Westminster school."

My favourite part of the day has got to be when we were taken into the Shrine at Westminster Abbey and we were able to see the grave of Edward the Confessor and the circle of the past Tudor Kings, usually a place where visitors can not visit."


• Megumi: "I liked learning about the Globe Theatre and listening to our instructor. I also enjoyed the activities!"

Science Week

We had a fantastic Science Week at Clifton Lodge with all the year groups involved. The theme this year was 'Change & Adapt'. Mr Bush kicked off Science Week with a thrilling Chemistry experiment during assembly. The Carbon Sugar Experiment demonstrated how molecules can change and adapt over time. The children were very engaged and asked lots of questions. To conclude the week, the children and their teachers had the chance to present their wonderful posters on the theme of 'Change and Adapt' at an assembly on the Friday. In addition, during the week each class was tasked with gathering height data of each pupil and presenting them in different formats. The children were really imaginative, using everything from marbles to string in order to showcase their results.



























Year 6 Persuasive Speeches

The Year 6s have been working on persuasive language and speeches, combining it with what we are learning about in Percy Jackson and the Lightning Thief. Each pupil was tasked with creating a vibrant and informative poster on joining a specific god's cabin (specifically: Apollo, Hephaestus, Hermes, Dionysus, Aphrodite, Athena, and Demeter).

The pupils then prepared short persuasive speeches using what they learnt and the information on the posters to present to the Year 3s to 5s. Each year group would vote on the speeches and posters based on which were the most convincing (the most voted for was the Dionysus cabin). Highlights of each included:

Apollo cabin as the cabin of creativity Hephaestus cabin as the cabin of technical intelligence Hermes cabin as the cabin of travellers Dionysus cabin as the cabin of pizza parties Aphrodite cabin as the cabin of socialising Athena cabin as the cabin of planning Demeter cabin as the cabin of healthy hard work

The children developed crucial skills in reflecting and adjusting their presentations based on different audiences and age ranges. Great fun was had by all, and fantastic work was done.

Residential Trip – Years 3 & 4 – PGL Lidington


